UV light and environmental and health conditions which can result in unsightly blemishes and disorders considered cosmetically unattractive.

Elaine is able to treat a wide range of blemishes including:

Thread veins

These are extremely common. They're not broken capillaries, as we call them, but permanently dilated capillaries. They have very thin walls which constantly dilate and constrict and, as we age, these vessels lose their elasticity, can become permanently dilated and noticeable. They may be caused by changes in temperature, smoking, hormonal changes, alcohol, skin fragility, pregnancy as well as being a possible inherited condition – it's not known for sure. They are commonly seen in a maturing 'English Rose' complexion.

and hyper-pigmentation marks are caused by an accumulation of a yellow pigment called lipofuscin caused by aging of the collagen producing cells.

Sometimes these cannot be successfully treated since the discolouration may be located in the deeper dermis and only the superficial epidermis is removed in the treatment. (You will be advised upon consultation whether any pigmentation treatment. you undergo will be expected to have a successful outcome.)

Sebaceous cyst

is a retention of sebum contained in a sebaceous sac under the skin that is blocked by an overgrowth of the surface epidermis. The size can vary from the equivalent of a pea to an egg. They most commonly appear on the face, chest, scalp and back. They may have an open or closed top and when small can be successfully treated using electrolysis.

Dermatosis Papulosa Nigra

are a common, non-contagious disorder which develops during adolescence on Afro-Caribbean skin (the actor Morgan Freeman has them).

They are smooth, dome shaped, brown to black papules, mainly seen on the cheeks, neck and upper chest.

Syringoma

are benign non-contagious, flesh-coloured elevations of the skin. They are mostly seen on the lower eyelids and upper cheeks.

Xanthomas

are deposits of fatty materials under the surface of the skin and can appear anywhere on the body. Xanthelasma Palpebra is a common type that appears on the eyelids. Xanthomas are commonly associated with elevated cholesterol levels.

The colour doesn't respond to treatment but the blemish size can be considerably reduced and then easily camouflaged with cosmetics.

Unsightly scars

can be atrophic (indented) or hypertrophic (raised). Using an advanced technique it's possible to smooth the skin and reduce the appearance of the scar. Though the colour cannot necessarily be changed or improved, any irregularity in depth or density can be softened and smoothed to improve the appearance.

Moles

can be visibly reduced and improved using advanced electrolysis techniques, however, for the patients

safety, it is essential to ensure that the mole is a perfectly normal, healthy mole before any treatment.

Healthy moles are often pigmented growths or small blemishes on the skin that commonly appear in the first few decades of life in almost everyone. The average young adult has about 25 moles. Unusual or atypical moles can signify an increased risk of melanoma although malignant melanomas can arise from both existing moles or from healthy skin.

The ABCDE rule helps recognise suspicious moles.

- A Asymmetry.
- B-Blurred Borders (irregular, or jagged edge)
- C Colour variation
- D Diameter larger than 5mm (1/4 inch),
- E-Elevation (especially when uneven)
- E-Evolution (changes over time).

Referral to a GP may be necessary prior to treatment.


I had a particularly noticeable cluster on my cheek which I was covering up most days with make-up and that make-up would often need reapplying.
